#### THE ASSUMPTION OF THE MOTHER OF GOD

The dogma of the *Assumption of the Mother of God* was proclaimed on 1<sup>st</sup> November 1950, by Pope Pius XII in the Apostolic Constitution -

#### 'Most Generous God'.

"For the glory of Almighty God, who bestowed special grace upon the Virgin Mary, in honour of His Son, the immortal King of the ages and the Conqueror of sin and death, to increase the glory of His Blessed Mother, to the inexpressible joy of the whole Church, by the authority of Our Lord Jesus Christ, the Holy Apostles Peter and Paul, and Ourself, we proclaim, declare, and define as dogma the truth revealed by God that the Immaculate Mother of God, ever Virgin Mary, after completing her earthly life, was assumed body and soul into heaven."

It is worth knowing that the dogma of the Assumption of the Blessed Virgin Mary says nothing about the death of the Mother of God. This issue is still the subject of debate among theologians. Some of them point to two possibilities:

+ + + If Mary died, then her Assumption preceded her Resurrection, and all these events must have occurred within a short period of time.

+ + + If Mary did not die, then the Assumption occurred at the moment when her earthly life ended. If this is the case, we cannot speak of death, but only of falling asleep.

The Church recognises that of all people, Mary was closest to the Holy Trinity. Therefore, she was granted the joy of seeing the Holy Trinity immediately after the end of her earthly life. Although the dogma of the Assumption of the Blessed Virgin Mary was not proclaimed until the mid-20<sup>th</sup> century, the feast in honour of Mary assumed into heaven was known already in the first centuries of Christianity. It was then called the *'Dormition of Mary'*. The proclamation of the dogma was only an official recognition of a truth that had long been recognised in the Church. Pope Pius XII recalled it and, with his authority, confirmed and sanctioned it as a dogma of faith.



The Assumption of Mary is not mentioned in Holy Scripture. All the events of the life of Our Lady described in the Gospels occurred during her earthly life. According to tradition, Mary lived for approximately 20 years after Christ's Resurrection. Throughout the many centuries of commemorating the end of Our Lady's life, the Church has not determined whether Mary died and was assumed into heaven body and soul after death, or whether she passed into heaven without dying, but merely 'falling asleep'.

**Pope John Paul II** took a clear stance on the possible death of Mary, on 25<sup>th</sup> June 1997, when he delivered his catechesis on 'The Dormition of the Virgin Mary'. The Holy Father noted that in the constitution 'Most Generous God', **Pius XII** 'does not consider it appropriate to solemnly affirm the death of the Mother of God as a truth that all the faithful must accept'.

'We wish to emphasize that the Mother of God certainly died because Christ also died. She passed through death because He also passed through death,' - John Paul II said at the time. However, we need to remember that papal catechesis does not have the power to definitively decide, but rather that it belongs to the ordinary teaching of the Church. Therefore, although Mary's death has not been proclaimed as a dogma of faith, it is nevertheless part of the ordinary teaching of the Catholic Church.

#### A NEW DOCTOR OF THE CHURCH



On 31st July, Pope Leo XIV proclaimed Cardinal John Henry Newman a Doctor of the Church. He became the 38th Saint in the history of the Church to be awarded this honorary title. This event holds not only immense theological significance but also spiritual and cultural significance, especially for Catholics living in a world dominated by secularism and scepticism.

When the Church proclaims someone a doctor, it is not only about recognising their personal holiness. It is about something more, that their teachings are of unique value to the entire People of God. Cardinal Newman - a convert, theologian, modern philosopher, pastor, has just joined this elite group. He is one of the few Doctors who lived in times similar to ours - a time of a revolution of ideas, crisis of faith and tension between religion and science.

Cardinal Newman is a saint of our times not only because he lived in the modern era. He is so, because he teaches how to be faithful in a world that does not facilitate such faithfulness. He shows us that one can be both deeply Catholic and deeply intellectual, that conscience matters, but only when well-formed. He shows us that the Church is not an outdated institution, but the living body of Christ, leading to truth.

The title of 'Doctor of the Church' is not only an honour. It is, above all, an invitation for us all to engage with his writings, to undertake the task of thinking with faith and believing with prudence. We are invited to remember, in a world of uncertainty and confusion, that "life here on earth is a pilgrimage, not a place of rest."

# THE SYMBOLIC DIMENSION OF THE UPCOMING CANONISATIONS >>> 7<sup>th</sup> SEPTEMBER 2025 <<<



**Blessed Carlo Acutis** and Blessed **Pier Giorgio Frassati** will be canonised together on **7**<sup>th</sup> **September 2025.** Two young Catholics whose lives inspired millions will be officially recognized as saints of the Catholic Church.



Carlo Acutis died in 2006 - when I was ordained a deacon - at the age of just 15 from leukaemia, but his life left a lasting mark on the hearts of the faithful. Born in London and raised in Milan, from a young age he was distinguished by a deep faith and an extraordinary relationship with the Eucharist. He was the one who said:

## 'The Eucharist is my highway to heaven'.

Carlo was also a talented programmer. In his teens, he created a virtual exhibition documenting over 100 Eucharistic miracles, which has since visited thousands of parishes around the world. The Vatican recognised a second miracle through Carlo's intercession in May 2024 - the miraculous healing of 21-year-old Valeria Valverde from Costa Rica after a serious brain injury. Her mother prayed at Carlo's tomb in Assisi. Despite all prognoses, the girl recovered. Carlo inspired more than just his peers. His witness led to the conversion of his Hindu caregiver and the restoration of his parents' faith. Just before his death, he offered his suffering "for the Pope and the Church."

# Pier Giorgio Frassati



Pier Giorgio Frassati, who died at the age of 24 in 1925, was an active lay Dominican, an engineering student, and a mountain enthusiast. Born in Turin to a journalistic family (his father was the founder of the daily newspaper La Stampa), it was not his social standing, but his life of service to the poor that made him exceptional. Frassati was active in the Society of St. Vincent de Paul from the age of 17, receiving Holy Communion daily, and supporting the homeless, soldiers, and the sick. His spiritual motto was: 'To the Heights'. He died of polio, which he likely contracted while ministering to the sick. Beatified by John Paul II in 1990, Frassati earned the title "Man of the Beatitudes."

Although separate ceremonies were originally planned - Carlo Acutis in April and Pier Giorgio Frassati in August - after the death of Pope Francis on 21<sup>st</sup> April 2025, the Vatican decided to combine the ceremonies. The new date, **7<sup>th</sup> September**, takes on a symbolic dimension: **holiness is accessible to both the modern teenager with a computer and the young activist of the 1920s.** 

Carlo and Pier Giorgio, though they lived in different eras, they show us that holiness does not depend on age, status, or era. One evangelised through the internet and technology, the other through service to those in need and love for the Eucharist. Their joint canonisations will not only be a joyful celebration for the Church but also a powerful sign to young people in our parish and around the world that holiness is not an abstraction. It is possible, alive, and necessary.

#### A NEW ROSARY GROUP IN OUR PARISH

An interesting proposal for those who like and want to pray but... live a busy life ②. Even though our lives are very busy, together we can pray **200 Hail Marys** every day ②!



Do you know that the Rosary is an incredibly powerful prayer? Do you have an important intention you'd like to pray for? It could be for your children, parents, for the sick, or for the deceased members of your family. It could be for the Pope, the Bishop, priests, for new vocations, for the sanctity of life. Or perhaps for our parish community, or for world peace? There may be many intentions for which you can pray.

Would you like to be part of a prayer group, but on the other hand you are hesitant and have many doubts, because you realise how busy you are with your family, study, work and so on? Do you know that as a parish, we can pray the entire Rosary every day? Do you know that it is possible, even though the Rosary consists of four mysteries, and each mystery consists of five decades. Yes, as a parish we can pray every day all 4 Mysteries, that is 20 Decades of the Holy Rosary (200 Hail Marys every day!)

Do you know that we can do this without leaving home, coming to church every day, or meeting with fellow parishioners every day or even every week? Would you like to help me start this prayer initiative in our parish? Would you be willing to commit to praying only one Decade of the Rosary every day. You can do this wherever you want, and wherever is convenient for you. It can be done at school or at work. It can be done on your way to work, shopping, or even on holiday. It can be done in the morning, at midday, in the afternoon, evening or at night.

- + + or **Sunday at 8:30 am** <u>We need at least 5 parishioners</u> to share between us the 5 decades of the **Sorrowful Mysteries**. On the first Sunday of each month after the 8.30 am Mass we will meet in Our Lady's chapel to say one decade of the Rosary together and exchange our cards.

+ + + or **Sunday at 10:30 am** - <u>We need at least 5 parishioners</u> to share between us the 5 decades of the **Glorious Mysteries**. On the first Sunday of each month after the 10.30 pm Mass we will meet in Our Lady's chapel to say one decade of the Rosary together and exchange our cards.

# Jubilee Year Indulgence



A plenary indulgence is a grace granted by the Church which cleanses our soul and helps us to grow closer to God. When we sin, we not only damage our relationship with God, we create a need for healing and repair in our souls and in the world. Through Reconciliation God forgives our sins, but the effects of our sins may still need to be addressed. Indulgences are a beautiful practice combining prayer, good works and spiritual renewal, to help repair that damage. Indulgences can also be applied to souls in purgatory.

#### WHAT IF I CAN'T DO THOSE THINGS DUE TO SICKNESS OR OTHER SERIOUS REASON?

United in spirit with the faithful taking part in person, one may recite the Our Father, Apostles Creed and Jubilee Prayer, offering their sufferings or hardships of their lives.

#### What must I do?

Be detached from all sin

Make a Sacramental Confession Receive Holy Communion

Pray for the Pope's Intentions

Notes: Normally, only one plenary indulgence can be obtained per day, However, the faithful who have carried out an act of charity on behalf of the souls in purgatory, if they receive holy Communion a second time that day, can obtain the plenary indulgence twice on the same day (applicable only to the deceased.)

A single sacramental confession is sufficient for several plenary indulgences, but frequent sacramental confession is encouraged in order to obtain the grace of deeper conversion and purity of heart. For each plenary indulgence that is sought, however, a separate holy Communion and a separate prayer for the intentions of the Holy Father are required.



## **Our Jubilee Churches**



The following churches have been designated Jubilee Churches by Bishop David Oakley within the Diocese of Northampton. A central focus of the Jubilee Year is the forgiveness of sins, especially through the granting of indulgences. As pilgrims of hope we are encouraged to make a pilgirmage to one of these churches, or another designated church outside our diocese, to obtain the graces of an indulgence. Pastoral areas, parishes and individuals are welcome to journey to any of these jubilee sites.
